

*Reports to:* Field Supervisor

*Responsibilities:*

1. The Ambulance Driver is responsible for the safe, efficient operation of the ambulance. The Ambulance Driver must arrive on time, in proper uniform, neat and clean. The driver must have a valid drivers license, on his/her person at all times while on duty. Drivers who do not meet these criteria will not be allowed to start work.

*Principal duties: (include, but are not limited to)*

1. Performs the required Vehicle / Equipment Check List in concert with the EMT attendant.
2. Reports and ensures correction of problems found during vehicle inspection.
3. Cleans the driver's compartment and windows, Assist the EMT attendant in cleaning as necessary.
4. Fuels vehicle as necessary.
5. Ensures that the vehicle is prepared for safe, legal operation prior to departing base.
6. Operates the vehicle in a safe manner in accordance with Company policy.
7. Secure permission from the EMT prior to operating with emergency lights and siren while enroute to assignments.
8. Assist the EMT attendant as requested.
9. Drives in a manner that will maximize comfort and safety of patients.
10. Complies with all State Vehicle and Traffic Laws
11. Promptly reports any accident no matter how minor and handle it in accordance with instruction from the Supervisor
12. In the event of an accident, collects all required information and complete incident reports in accordance with Company policy.
13. Maintains certifications.

The Ambulance Driver may from time to time be exposed to working in inclement weather conditions, or may be potentially exposed to blood-borne and airborne pathogens, hazardous materials, or combative patients. The Ambulance Driver must be physically able to lift 125 pounds of weight and must be able to function under the stress of emergency conditions involving the provision of health care to patients in life-threatening conditions.

*Qualifications:*

1. High school diploma or equivalent.
2. Valid vehicle operators license, insurable by the Company's insurance underwriter.
3. Current CPR certificate (American Red Cross or American Heart Association)
4. At least 21 years of age, preferred
